WHAT IS A “SENDING SCHOOL”?

The School for Ethics and Global Leadership’s sending schools **encourage students to apply for admission and enroll at SEGL each semester without requiring the student to pay tuition at the sending school while attending SEGL.** These schools also **provide time and space for SEGL representatives to speak with their students** during admissions season.

In return, SEGL gives sending school applicants **priority in admissions**, as well as an **outstanding, rigorous experiential program** that is aligned with the sending school’s mission. SEGL now has 25 sending schools in 16 states and abroad.

WHY SHOULD MY SCHOOL BECOME A SENDING SCHOOL?

Mission Alignment The most important reason to become an SEGL sending school is mission alignment. SEGL’s mission is *to provide a diverse group of intellectually motivated high school juniors from across the United States with the best possible opportunity to shape themselves into ethical leaders who will create positive change in our world.* We encourage schools with similar goals to consider becoming a sending school.

Outstanding Academic Preparation SEGL’s curriculum is demanding, practical, collaborative, and interdisciplinary. In addition to honors/AP-level courses in English, U.S. History, Comparative Government, mathematics, chemistry, physics, and language, SEGL requires an Ethics and Leadership class and an Introduction to Arabic and Chinese Language and Culture class.

A Unique Opportunity SEGL immerses students in the challenges facing the international community. It places the full scope of Washington, DC resources at students’ fingertips: public policy practitioners, NGOs, elected officials, embassies, and leading academics.

College Admissions Students who attend SEGL should be well-positioned in the college admissions process. They will have completed a rigorous academic program alongside outstanding students from around the country that includes three capstone projects: A personal Credo; a collaborative, meticulously researched policy document; and a meaningful leadership project in their home community.

WHAT ABOUT “LOST” TUITION?

Most sending schools **manage enrollment to limit or eliminate the effect of allowing students to leave for a semester.** (SEGL can help provide guidance in this process.) Ideally, SEGL furthers a sending school’s mission and is not seen as a potential resource drain.

It is also worth noting that **many sending schools use their relationship with SEGL to attract outstanding students**, and (at day schools) to retain those who might otherwise attend boarding institutions.

WHAT ABOUT FINANCIAL AID?

Many sending schools develop a special sending school relationship with us by making their students’ financial aid packages “portable.” SEGL plans to be need-blind in its admissions decisions, and has funds to help families who cannot pay the full cost of attending.
